# Solemnity of Christ the King

We all have our own ideas about what makes a true king. They are coloured from the world of sport, the 'King of Sevens'; in the world of music, Elvis 'The King' Presley; in the world of films, 'The Lion King'; in the world of books, 'Lord of the Rings'; and the kings of our beauty pageants. Most countries that have royalty the king or queen does not have a major say in the day-to-day running of government. Yet the one thing that holds these together is that they all have some kind of following.

Jesus has his followers as well. His way of being king though is completely different altogether. It is not about the bright lights, the fame or the adoring fans. Rather, it's about being "handed over to men who will kill him. Three days later, however, he will rise to life"(Mk.9:31). What about the crowds on Palm Sunday? Where were they on Good Friday?

Jesus established a kingdom that is not of this world. We see the plan of God in the opening lines of the Book to the Hebrews. "In the past God spoke to our ancestors many times and in many ways through the prophets, but in these last days he has spoken through his Son. He is the one whom God created the universe, the one whom God has chosen to possess all things at the end of time. He reflects the brightness of God's glory and is the exact likeness of God's own being, sustaining the universe with his powerful word. After achieving the forgiveness for sins of mankind, he sat down in heaven at the right side of God, the Supreme Power"(1:1-3).

To get the full picture we must see that Jesus is not just king, "to serve is to reign" but also priest, offering up his life in sacrifice, and prophet, standing up for the truth. These three functions were present in the Old Testament as we see in the coronation of Solomon. "King David said, 'Call to me Zadok the priest, Nathan the prophet..."(1Kings 1:32-5). Yet they were not always in harmony. At the beginning of Israel's history there were no kings as God was seen as their king. The prophets, in their time, often spoke against the rulers of the day. The priests were mostly, though not completely, involved with the Temple in Jerusalem. With the destruction of that building in 70 AD they no longer had a part to play.

These three responsibilities have also been handed on to us at the anointing after our baptism. The celebrant says, "He now anoints you with the chrism of salvation, so that, united with his people, you may remain forever a member of Christ who is Priest, Prophet, and King". We are priests in the offering of our lives to God; we are prophets in giving witness to the truth; we are kings in our ruling as servants. Of course, the Second Vatican Council supports this. "Let missionaries as God's co-workers (cf. 1Cor.3:9), raise up congregations of the faithful who will walk in a manner worthy of their vocation to which they have been called(cf.4:1) and will exercise their priestly, prophetic and royal office which God has entrusted to them. In this way, the Christian community becomes a sign of God's presence in the world.....By their prayers and active labours, religious men and women play an indispensable role too in rooting and strengthening the kingdom of Christ in souls and in causing it to expand"('on the Missions', no. 15).
